## **Principal's Chat**

Hi everyone,

As mentioned previously, bookings for this term's Student Support Group (SSG) meetings and next term's Parent Teacher interviews are now open on uEducateUs, so make sure you log in and book your spot. We have allocated 15 minute slots for Parent Teacher interviews and 40 minute slots for SSG meetings. Student Support Group (SSG) meetings are a requirement for all students who receive Disability Inclusion school funding, students in Out of Home Care or students who are Indigenous. On the 24<sup>th</sup> June, we will employ a relief teacher to release teachers for the Student Support Group meetings, so please book in a time on this day if your child requires an SSG meeting. Booking an alternative date for this interview will be difficult due to teachers being in class. If you are having trouble booking or are unsure of which type of meeting you require, please phone the office.

We have noticed an increase in the number of students regularly arriving late to school. Please endeavour to get your child/children to school in time for the 8.52am bell as this allows them time to prepare for the day and start the day on a positive note. If your child is late to school please bring them to the office rather than taking them directly to the classroom. This serves two purposes, letting us know that they are at school so that the roll can be altered and not unsettling the class who have already started learning for the day.

The Winter Solstice in Australia marks the shortest day and longest night of the year, after which the days gradually lengthen as the Southern Hemisphere moves towards Spring and Summer. This Friday marks the Winter Solstice, and Maldon Inc. has been actively preparing for various events planned throughout the school holidays. Our school families have been invited to participate in this Friday night's activities and bonfire. Those interested can gather at Maldon Train Station at 6pm. From there, once the train arrives at about 6:30pm, everyone will walk to the Maldon Museum, located near the Men's Shed, where the bonfire will be held. There will be some entertainment and food available for people. This is not a school event and children will be in their parents/carers care for this event. Next Monday we will be sending home your child's school report. This term there will be two reports. A progress report will be included with the learning dispositions and I can achievements for literacy and numeracy along with student work samples. From parent/carer feedback last term, this term we have included a student self assessment of their learning dispositions. The rating scale has also changed for the teachers and is now based on how often the teacher observes your child showing this disposition (frequently, quite often, occasionally, rarely). Given this is a new style of reporting, we would still like further parent/carer feedback on ways we can improve and strengthen this work. Parents/

Progression points will be included for a number of subject areas and is based on your child's level of achievement against the Victorian Curriculum.

When reporting to parents/carers, teachers use all the evidence and knowledge they have gained over the semester to place every child at a level of the Victorian Curriculum. These scores are shown in the student report like this:

This week, our school is emphasising the value of reflecting on our learning, aligning well with the end of the semester and preparing to start fresh next term. Our whole school values/behaviour focus is: I set learning goals and strive to be my best (Be your best). The 'I can' statements the children will be working towards are:

I know my strengths and weaknesses

I can reflect on my learning this term

I can set learning goals and personal goals

I can make a plan to achieve my goals

## Something which may interest our families...

#### It's school report time!

A moment to celebrate for some kids. A moment to dread for others.

So, when that piece of paper of shows up in your inbox, mailbox or their school bag (possibly hidden for some time) what are some ways parents can process it all to help bring out the best in their child?

#### In the younger years

Go though it as it is written

Don't just focus on the 'good' or 'bad' results - but discuss every point. While you can say how proud you are,

ideally ask them how they feel about getting an A for effort or being told they could be less chatty. This will help them remember to do school work for themselves, not you and will help them develop self-motivation. You could ask them what they could do to stop talking so much in class.

#### Remember it is a moment in time

You might want to get on social media and crow about your child's straight As or diss the teacher for your child's Cs, but keep in mind the report is not necessarily reflective of their future. Talk to the teacher about concerns, but don't be too worried. Even being a little older than or younger than others in their class can impact their results much more in the early years.

#### In the older years

#### Have them self-assess before you open it

If your child is in late primary or high school, before they even open the report card, get them to write what they think will be written about their behaviour, efforts and results. In this, you get them to think about what they think they deserve and then compare it to their actual result. You will also get to see if they have the self-awareness to know what their strengths are and what they might not be doing well.

Have them look at it before you do.

Once your child can read, it is a good idea for them to check their report card and make comments about their results before you see it. It's their work and they should be the first one to see the outcome of their efforts.

#### Don't get too emotional

When parents respond with extreme anger or happiness over a report card, they usurp their child's reaction. This encourages children to react to their parent's emotions, much more than personally react to their efforts. Words such as "After all the money I spend!" or "You are so much more intelligent than this!" are particularly bad as they start arguments - "Well you sent me to that stupid school!". A more useful question is "How do you feel about these results and comments?" which allows them to process it all and feel the emotions they need to experience to effect change or experience personal pride due to their efforts.

#### Look at the really important things

Pay more attention to what the teacher has said about their efforts in class than their numerical results. This is because *effort* also reflects their motivation and behaviour. In the long run, these qualities will do far better for them than their intelligence, so it is the category you should pay most attention to.

Accept your child for who they are.

Children are a combination of strengths and weaknesses and their academic results account for only a small number. If you keep telling them who they could be, you don't accept them for who they are. Their A or C in Maths might mean a lot now, but it is their developing skills of resilience, self-regulation, resourcefulness, respect and responsibility which will impact their future much more.

#### Takeaway for parents

Some questions you can ask your child when they see their report card.

- What are you proud of?
- What are you disappointed by even though you tried your best? What can you say to yourself not to fixate on the disappointment too much?
- Is there anything critical your teachers have said that you agree with?
- Do you want to do anything differently next semester? What is your plan to do this? Do you need some coaching from teachers or me to help you do this?
- Is there anything you are confused by and need to talk to the teacher about? Are you confident to have that conversation or can I help you practice?

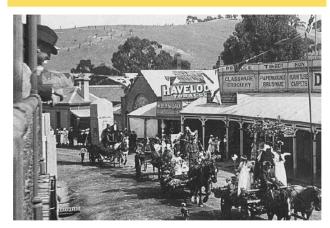
